Teacher Guidance Notes

Ecology

- Recognise that living things are suited to their particular habitat

Thinking

1 hour

Many different habitats occur on Rangatira Island and these are home to many different bird species. The introduction allows students to see the habitats on the island, and introduces some of the bird species living there. The worksheet asks students to identify parts of birds and gives some simple information about each bird featured.

Show students the pictures on the power point. Spend time explaining each picture using the Power point information sheet for	PowerPoint - Which bird lives where?
guidance. Talk about the parts of the birds and why different birds have different beaks	Birds and their Habitat information sheet
